Fundraising and maintaining the church: Giving to Church

Maintaining the church is becoming more expensive. We currently pay around £5,000 per month to cover our regular running costs, including what we pay to the diocese (the 'parish share') for clergy stipends and other shared costs. That's a lot, but it has not increased significantly over the last ten years. But we now face rising bills, especially for energy.

To meet this bill, we depend overwhelmingly on what we as a congregation can give: that accounts for 70% of our income. The PCC would therefore like to invite everyone to consider what they can and should give. We know that many members of our congregation have little income, but give generously of their time instead. For everyone else, the Church of England recommends that we should aim to give 5% of our after-tax income to the church. Nationally, the average level of giving is now 3%.

Please consider joining our regular giving scheme by making a standing order to church. If you are already part of this scheme, please consider whether you are able to increase your giving. If you are a taxpayer, you should also sign a Gift Aid declaration so that we can reclaim the tax on your donations, which increases their value by 25%. At the moment, we are not taking a physical collection so other ways of giving are more important.

The collection box is on the table by the door for those who wish to make cash donations.


EasyFundraising
