English: Round the World in 80 Days was written in 1872 (As was What Katy Did).

Science and Technology:

telegraph, trains and typewriters - proliferating! Tin openers, medicines, disinfectants. Vaseline and PVC were invented...

History: Wettest year on record in UK; US elections a bit of a mess: but a female candidate was nominated which is interesting and another candidate died during the count.

There was a Civil war in Spain (the one nobody remembers)

Geography

It would be interesting to do a historical map comparison – get a map of the parish area from 1872 and get the pupils from St James' School to put pins where they live now and see what was there then.

Art: Whistler's mother! (aka the Study in Black and Grey) And lots of Impressionists.

1872: Events in the UK:

1 January – C. P. Scott becomes editor of *The Manchester Guardian*, a position he will hold until 1929.

16 March – in the first ever final of the FA Cup, the world's oldest football competition, Wanderers F.C. defeat Royal Engineers A.F.C. 1–0 at The Oval in Kennington, London.

3 July - Queen Victoria opens the Albert Memorial in memory of her husband Prince Albert.

18 July Ballot Act introduces secret ballots in United Kingdom elections.

16 November – London Metropolitan Police strike....

21 November – Wigan F.C. founded, the first Association football team in Wigan.

25 November – loss of the iron sailing ship *Royal Adelaide* on Chesil Beach: 60 saved, 7 drowned.

30 November – Scotland v England, the first FIFA-recognized international Association football match, takes place at Hamilton Crescent in Scotland. The result is a goalless draw. (Clearly no penalty shoot-outs in those days.)

6 December – Springwell Pit disaster at Dawley in Shropshire: eight coal miners fall to their death when a winding chain snaps.

12 December – a meteorite strikes Earth near Banbury.

21 December – the *Challenger* expedition sails from Portsmouth on the four-year scientific expedition that will lay the foundation for the science of oceanography.

his Sunday marks the fifth anniversary of the Arena bombing back in 2017. It is hard to believe that it was so long ago. Many of us remember where we were on that day: people in schools and other workplaces, looking around to see who might be missing. We opened up the church for anyone who might want to come in, and clearly heard the loud bang as the door was blown off the bomber's home down along Wilbraham Road. People were very shocked. Today we remember in prayer the victims, their families and friends, and all who still carry the physical and mental scars of that day.

In our journey back to normality after Covid,

the Church of England is now advising that receiving communion in both kinds is safe. This is of course a matter of personal choice and consideration. <u>Cleaning our hands</u> before receiving and <u>avoiding</u> the practice of intinction (dipping the consecrated bread into the wine) are advised as common sense. Being present in church when we can, to be part of a worshipping community remains part of our duty and our joy as Christians – meeting together to celebrate the Eucharist – Sunday by Sunday and on feast days.

For us in this church, Pentecost is the day this year when we remember that our church opened its doors for worship 150 years ago. It is interesting to note that among its earliest members, one of the trustees, Walter Flinn, traded with 'Persia' or Iran as we know it. He sold cars and imported textiles and carpets. His grandson published a book of Persian Folksongs. 150 years later, this church continues its connection with Iran, through our many Iranian members, far and near, past and present.
